columns, and by the Agricultural press
of the United States. These concerns
sell nursery stock and give a contract
to the effect that they will agree to
trim the trees for the first five years,
that they will replace free. The first
crop of fruit that the trees produce
they will pay fair market prices for
same.

Payments for the trees are to be dis-
tributed over several years, but the
first payment to be made is in itself a
fair market price for the value of the
trees. The customer accepts his trees
on delivery, makes the first payment,
and this is the last that he ever hears
of the concern. Such fraudulent
methods should not be tolerated. Our
fruit owners will act in their own
interests if they refuse to have any-
thing to do with such concerns."
