Crown Attorney Baird has ordered an inquest to be conducted by Dr. Scott into the death of J. Partridge, who was found dead in the cellar of his home at Newmarket. It appears that Partridge went down to the cellar some time in the night, and while groping around in the darkness put his hand on the exposed part of an electric wire. He was unable to remove it, and was electrocuted. The body was discovered in the morning with the hand still on the wire, and the power had to be turned off at the plant before the body could be removed, so surcharged was it with electricity. The power is supplied by the town. The inquest will go on at Newmarket on Monday night.
