A GOOD SELECTION.

We believe the Toronto Board of Education has done itself credit in votes recently taken. At the last meeting of the old Board a resolution was carried repealing a former resolution to the effect that flags should fly over every public school in the city every day in the year. The hoisting of the Union Jack is a sign of loyalty, but it is doubtful if flying the flag every day would mean as much as displaying it on Empire Day, Dominion Day, the King's birthday, or other special occasions. Canadians are, as they should be, loyal to the core, but loyalty and patriotism should always be tempered with that sanity which distinguishes a moderate and broad-minded people.

The new Board also did well in electing as their chairman Mr. James
Simpson, a gentleman who well
merits the tribute paid him by his
colleagues. It is true the coveted
position was won only by the casting vote of the chairman, but when it is remembered the solid "Protestant ticket" was against him he did remarkably well. His opponent for the position of chairman-Mr. Levee -is an active member of the Board, but it is generally thought he takes more interest in questions, such as flying the flag over the schools on the 12th of July, than he does in matters affecting the welfare of the school childeen. Surely in a city like Toronto, where the population is overwhelmingly Protestant, the people can afford to be generous to those who think differently in minor matters.



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
