

CANADA IS LOYAL.

It is only natural that on many public questions the Government and the Opposition will entertain different views. Even in the question of Naval defence Liberals and Conservatives are not expected to hold the same opinions in writing out the details. There is every reason for saying that the great majority of Canadians, whether Grit or Tory, are in favor of doing something handsome as a part of the British Empire. There is no ground for charging any class of people with disloyalty, though it may be that some Provinces as a whole show more enthusiasm than others.

It is unfortunate, therefore, that a section of the Conservative press and politicians endeavors to make it appear that Liberals are not sincere in their professions of loyalty. The Defence question is a serious matter, a matter not to be trifled with. But that reason party politics should be laid aside when the question is under discussion. Everybody agrees that it is time that Canada should begin to assume a reasonable share of the responsibilities of Empire. For many years Britain has been looked upon as "Mistress of the Seas" If that title meant war with other nations the distinction might not be honorable. But it does not mean war. Judging by the past it is nearer the mark to say that supremacy of the British Empire ensures the peace of the world. Let every true Canadian do what he can to promote harmony among races and creeds, and let one political side cease accusing their opponents of disloyalty when the charge is altogether without foundation.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party favor a Canadian navy, to be built in Canada with Canadian money, by Canadian workmen. Mr. Borden, the leader of the Opposition, would give to England at once \$25,000,000 to build two Dreadnoughts. Then he would refer the question of spending \$11,500,000 on a Canadian navy to a plebiscite of the people. There need be no plebiscite. Canadians from one side of the country to the other are prepared to assist in the defence of the empire to which they belong.

That the people of Canada are prospering under the policy of the Laurier administration cannot be doubted. On December 31, 1908, the deposits in Canadian banks amounted to \$722,769,156, between that date and 30th November, 1909, the deposits rose to \$858,447,245. This is what Sir Wilfrid Laurier meant when he said that under a Liberal administration the people would know they were prosperous by the jingle of the money in their pockets.

I leave to my parents during the rest of their lives as much sorrow as humanity, in a feeble and decrepit state, can sustain.

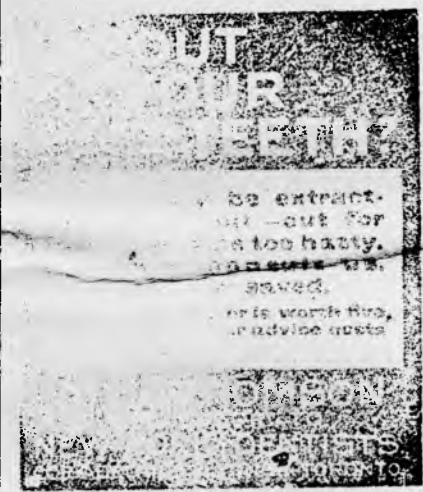
I leave to my brothers and sisters as much mortification and injury as I could well bring on them.
