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WEST YORK LIBERALS.  
Enthusiasm marked the annual ban-  
quet and rally of the West York  
Liberal Association, which was held in  
the town hall at Weston Friday night.  
The stalwarts of the riding were pre-  
sent to the number of more than two  
hundred, and during the speech mak-  
ing the capacity of the auditorium was  
taxed to the utmost, with standing  
room at a premium. The meeting was  
acknowledged by all as the most suc-  
cessful and enthusiastic ever held un-  
der the auspices of the association.

The elections were held in the after-  
noon, the balloting resulting as fol-  
lows:—President, Mr. George W. Ver-  
ral of Weston; first Vice-President,  
Mr. David Norton, Woodbridge; sec-  
ond Vice-President, Mr. Geo. Pear-  
son; Richview; third Vice-President,  
Mr. J. Wallis, Woodbridge; fourth  
Vice-President, Mr. W. H. Baldwin,  
West Toronto; Secretary, Mr. G. H.  
Gray, Weston; Treasurer, Mr. Nelson  
McEwen, Weston.

Mr. Verral, who was the re-elected  
President, was in charge of the pro-  
ceedings, and to him in no small de-  
gree, was the success of the meeting  
due. With him on the platform were  
the speakers of the evening:—Messrs.  
Senator A. Campbell, Dr. P. D. Mc-  
Lean, Mr. S. Clarke, M.P.P., West  
Northumberland, and Mr. J. McEwing,  
M.P.P. for West Wellington. Others  
at the head table were:—Messrs. Hen-  
ry Pearson, W. C. Grubbe, Dr. Irwin,  
and D. McLennan.

Senator Campbell, responding to the  
toast "Canada," gave a comprehensive  
review of the history of the county  
from the time of Champlain to the  
present day. He told how its vast  
resources were being developed under  
the Liberal administration at Ottawa,  
and how the foreign trade of the Do-  
minion had increased since 1896 from  
\$239,000,000 to \$750,000,000. The Sen-  
ator said he was confident that great  
results would follow quickly upon the  
opening of the Grand Trunk Pacific  
Railway from ocean to ocean. The in-  
creased value of the timber and miner-  
als alone in the districts through which  
the steel would pass would more than  
pay for the cost of the construction, he  
said. He was pleased to be able to  
say that a national spirit was taking  
hold of the people.

Mr. Clarke, in a delightful address,  
paid glowing tributes to the qualities  
and great ability of Sir Wilfrid Lau-  
rier and Hon. A. G. Mackay, leader  
of the Opposition in the Ontario Leg-  
islature. Conservatives were fond  
of declaring that the prosperity of the  
Province was due entirely to their  
efforts. He did not wish to take away  
any of the credit due them, but he  
could not help feeling that much of  
the greatness of Ontario was built upon  
the solid foundations laid by grand old  
Liberal leaders such as Sir Oliver  
Mowat, Christopher Fraser, A. S.  
Hardy and G. W. Ross. These men  
had never allowed the expenditure of  
the Province to exceed the income;  
they had floated no bonds, and, with  
small funds at their disposal, had pro-  
vided homes, asylums, and public insti-  
tutions all over Ontario. The building  
in Queen's Park, he said, was a monu-  
ment to them.
