RE-OPENING SERVICE.

A service to commemorate the re-opening of Trinity church, Thornhill, after re-seating and decoration, was held Thursday evening, Feb. 24th. The Rev. Canon Powell of St. Clement's church, Eglinton, preached the sermon. He chose for his text the eighth and ninth verses of the ninety sixth Psalm, "Give unto the Lord the Glory due unto His name, bring an offering and come into His Courts. O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness, fear before Him all the earth." After referring briefly to the extensive repairs lately made in the church, he proceeded to demonstrate the nature of true worship, which he said consists not in receiving but in giving, not in going up to God's house to hear sermons or to listen to the music, but in giving to God the honor due His holy name, in the beauty that is inherent in a life of righteousness and true holiness. The choir of St. Clement's church was present and lead the musical parts of the service in a highly reverent and becoming manner. The congregation was large reaching about two hundred, and filled the new seats and others specially provided for the occasion. The collection, which will be devoted to the fund for making the improvements, amounted to thirty two dollars. The improvements that have been made consist of new seats for the congregation and choir, cleaning and decorating the interior, and providing new carpet for the chancel and matting for the passages, and also new lamps. The total cost of these improvements will be about seven hundred dollars. The congregation and friends of the church have responded most liberally to the appeal for assistance and the prospects are that the whole costs will be wiped off and no debt remain.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

March 1st, 1910.
The local Board of Health met on the above date in the Village Council Chamber.

Present: Mr. W. H. Pugsley, chairman; Mr. I. Crosby, Mr. M. McNair, Dr. Wilkinson and A. J. Hume.

The chairman stated that the meeting was called to consider the advisability of taking steps for the protection of the village against rabies, the Board having been notified by the Provincial Board of Health that the disease is present in that section of Ontario of which York County is a part, and also asking the co-operation of the local Board of Health in enforcing the regulations of the department with respect to dogs.

Moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. McNair, that the Village Council be asked to pass a by-law for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of an order for the regulation of dogs which has been approved of by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.—Carried.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to issue a proclamation in accordance with the above proceedings. Board adjourned.

NELSON SHIELDS FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS.

There are no charges or conditions. The British and Foreign Sailors' Society, which received the "Victory" copper from the Lords of the British Admiralty, has undertaken the expense of mounting, engraving and distributing these historic Shields, and only asks some voluntary contribution to reimburse them and aid their Sailors' Institutes for men of the Royal Navy, Merchant Ships, etc., in Canada and all over the world. These Nelson Shields are highly valued for their patriotic and educational uses in the Universities, Colleges and Schools where they are already placed. Private Colleges and Schools are eligible to receive the Nelson Shield, and should apply for them.
