A MUCH NEEDED BILL.

Mr. T. H. Lennox, M.P.P. for North York, has introduced a bill in the Ontario Legislature to amend the Ontario Railway Act by allowing municipalities to apply to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board for a connection between two railways. At present only either company can apply. The immediate object of the bill is to permit the County of York to apply for a connection between the Metropolitan and the Toronto Railway Company's lines at North Toronto.

The bill should be allowed to pass and become law. At present, citizens at Sutton, Newmarket, Aurora, Richmond Hill, and all places along the line can only ship their produce or any kind of freight as far as the C.P.R. crossing. If travellers want to take a trunk with them they must hunt up a teamster at the C.P.R. crossing and have it taken to the Union Station, and run the risk of losing their train.

And what are the reasons given for not having a connection between the Metropolitan and the Toronto Ccmpany's lines? Toronto says the Metropolitan may enter the city and run its cars to the market or to the Union Station till the year 1921, after which date the Metropolitan may be told to cease operations in the city, as Toronto may then take over the Street Railway and run it as a municipal institution.

The Metropolitan cannot be blamed very much for declining such an offer. The latter say they will enter into an agreement with the city on condition that the Metropolitan be allowed to continue running their cars through the city after the year 1921, the price to be paid for the franchise to be settled by arbitration.

And while the Company and the City Council are squabbling over their differences the farmers and other citizens in the County of York are suffering for want of an entrance into the city. But the city says we have only 11 more years to wait, and then we shall be given the required accommodation. Surely, patience is a virtue.


