WHO ARE H. S. TRUSTEES.

As was pointed out last week it is rften difficult to get a quorum of members for the monthly meetings of the Richmond Hill Board of Education. One of the reasons given by some of those trustees appointed by the County Council is that since the passing of the new school Act in 1909 by the Ontario Government, they do not consider they are now members of the Board. The interpretation of the law is that trustees must reside in the municipality in which tle High School is situated. In this case they must be residents of Rielmond Hill. This change in the law is very awkward, and, we believe, should be repealed. We cannot see any good reason why residents of Vaughan and Markham Townships should not be allowed to represent the outside parts vear York County Council gives a very generous grant for the maintenance of our High School. Why should the trustees be confined to Richmond Hill alone. But an understanding should be reached at once, or our High School will suffer. We believe the present trustees are all legally entitled to sit on the Beard till the end of their terms.

MILLER BILL AMENDED.

Mr. Miller who made a good fight for the passing of his anti-gambling bill in Parliament last week, is now being criticized in some quarters for accepting a compromise. Although the new measure is a poor substitute for the original bill it is but fair to say that Mr. Miller did his duty in accepting the compromise after he found that his former efforts had failed. The same credit can scarcely be riven, however, to those who took he side of the race track gamblers, as they readily saw that public opinion was against the gambling mania, and doubtless were afraid that a more strigent bill would be passed at the next sitting of Parlia-

The bill as amended acknowledges the legality of bookmaking on race tracks, allows jockey clubs to holdraces every day in the year, but betting may take place in fourteen of those days only. No doubt the law as aniended is an improvement on past laws, but hundreds of young men may yet be able in the fourteen days allowed for betting, to squander all the money they were able to make the balance of the year and it is feared in some cases, some of their employer's money as well.


