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## VAUGHAN COUNCIL.

The above Council met at the Town-  
ship Hall April 12.

Members present, Mr. D. C. Long-  
house, Reeve; Mr. J. A. Cameron,  
Deputy-Reeve; and Messrs. Henry W.  
Ellis, J. T. Saigeon and J. S. McNair,  
Councillors.

Minutes of last regular meeting read  
and confirmed.

A petition was presented, signed by  
Dr. W. H. Carleton and 40 others,  
ratepayers in the Village of Thornhill,  
asking the Council to have a By-law  
passed commuting Statute Labor in  
the said village of Thornhill for the  
east halves of Lots 30 and 31, Con. 1.

The following communications were  
received.

From James O'Connor, resigning  
the office of Sanitary Inspector of the  
Township of Vaughan.

From Wm. Proudfoot Esq., K. C.  
asking the intention of the Council in  
regard to appealing the Gamble case.

Mr. Fred Cousins appeared before  
the Council in regard to a grievance  
between lots 15 and 16 Con. 7.

Messrs. Fred Hicks and John Train-  
er of Pine Grove appeared before the  
Council, asking for a grant for Mr.  
Wm. Turnbull, who had sickness in  
his family.

McNair—Saigeon—That the Clerk  
be and is hereby instructed to prepare  
a By-Law to commute Statute Labor  
in the village of Thornhill, in accord-  
ance with the wishes of the petition-  
ers, said By-Law to be passed on May  
20th 1910.—Carried.

Ellis—McNair—That the resignation  
of James O'Connor, Teston, as Sanitary  
Inspector for the year 1910, be  
accepted, and that Mr. Wm. Mullin of  
Kleinburg, be appointed for the bal-  
ance of the year.—Carried.

Cameron—Ellis—That the members  
of this Council meet as a whole with  
Mr. Fred Cousins, between lots 15 and  
16, Con. 7, on Friday April 22nd, at 2  
o'clock p. m. for the purpose of con-  
sidering the grievance said by him to  
exist, by reason of a deviation be-  
tween said lots.—Carried.

Saigeon—McNair—That a grant of  
\$30.00 be made to Mr. Wm. Turnbull,  
on account of the recent illness in his  
family, and the Treasurer be and is  
hereby authorized to pay the same—  
Carried.

Saigeon—Cameron—That the Clerk  
be and is hereby instructed to notify  
Messrs. Fred Hicks of Pine Grove and  
Thos. Sullivan of Toronto, to have  
the weigh scales in Pine Grove re-  
moved at once, as they are in a dan-  
gerous condition.—Carried.

McNair—Ellis—That changes be  
made in the following Road Beats  
throughout the Township as follows:  
—That the East Halves of Lots 59 and  
60 con. 1, be taken from Road Division  
No. 7 and placed in Road Division  
No. 14.

That the West Half of Lot 56 con.  
1, be taken from road division No. 7,  
the West Half of lot 57, con. 1, be taken  
from road division No. 14, and lots  
30, 31, and 32, con. 2, be taken from  
road division No. 14, and be placed in  
one division known as Road Division  
No. 80.

That lots 31, 32, 33, 34, and 35 in the  
11th con. be placed in Road Division  
No. 79.

That the East Half of lot 22, con. 9,  
be taken from Road Division No. 6  
and placed in Road Division No. 66. 8.

That the West Half lot 27, con. 8  
and the West part of lot 28 con. 8  
also the East parts of lots 27 and 28,  
con. 9, be taken from Road Division  
No. 67 and placed in Road Division  
No. 68.

That the West parts of lots 25 and  
26 con. 8, be taken from Road Division  
No. 67 and placed in No. 58.

That the East parts of lots 26 and 27  
con. 9, be taken from Road Division  
No. 67, and placed in Road Division  
No. 56.—Carried.

On motion the clerk was instructed  
to pay a number of road accounts.

The following By-Laws were then  
passed:—

By-Law No. 880, dividing the Inter-  
est of the Clergy Reserve Fund  
among the several schools in the  
Township.

By-Law 881, dividing the interest of  
Municipal Loan Fund among the sev-  
eral schools in the Township.

By-Law 882, to prohibit the deposit-  
ing of dirt or other materials upon  
the Highways in the Township, and  
to compel the muzzling of dogs.

By-Law No. 883, appointing over-  
seers of Highways for the year 1910.

Council then adjourned to meet at  
the Town Hall, Vellore, on Thursday,  
May 26th, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m., as a  
Court of Revision of the assessment  
rolls of the Township of Vaughan for  
the year 1910, and general business at  
2 o'clock p. m.
