Thornhill.

Miss Edith P. Stevenson, whose recent exhibition of portraits in Toronto created considerable interest, has just completed negotiations with the City of Youngstown, Ohio, whereby she agrees to paint at least thirty oil portraits of judges, past and present, of the Mahoning County Bar, the pictures to hang in the new \$4,000,000 court house. This is one of the largest commissions of its kind ever given at a stated time to an individual artist, and the American city has authorized the expenditure of more than \$35,000 for paintings. A number of the portraits will of necessity be done from photographs, and these Miss Stevenson, who left for the United States on Wednesday, plans to bring back to Thornhill to do at her leisure, those from life of course being painted in Youngstown.

Albert Horan, a young man in the employ of Mr. David Boyle at Langstaff, met with a serious accident one day last week. While working in the barn he fell off a ladder receiving a bad fracture of the ankle. He was removed to his home at Thornhill, and the Emergency Hospital, Toronto was communicated with. In a short time the ambulance arrived and the young man was removed to the city. He was placed under chloroform and the fracture was reduced. The break is a severe one, and it will in all probability be some months before the patient will be able to do much work.

The Company has recently purchased the plant, system and franchises of The Vandorf Telephone Company, Limited and Central Telephone Company, Limited, and has now in operation 131 miles of pole line with 278 miles of Metallic circuit. The Company is also a member of the Mutual Telephone Exchange which gives to its subscribers a very extensive service throughout these Counties. The amount of stock at present issued and paid up \$13,375.00. The Company is managed by a board of seven directors, the qualification of each being the holder of at least Four fully paid up shares in the Capital Stock of the said Company.

The present value of the plant and system of the Company is estimated at \$2006.42 and with accounts receivable and cash on hand amounting to \$1239.32, the total assets of the Company are \$27,355.74.
