A TRIP THROUGH THE NORTH COUNTRY.

With the object of seeing the conditions of the settlers in the country north of town, the writer, with Mi. Phil Brenton, took a three day's trip out there last week, and found that the reports as to the growth of the

out there last week, and found that the reports as to the growth of the district were not a bit exaggerated.

Starting from Gull Lake early in the morning, the first thing noticed was the amount of new breaking in the hills close to town, a large part of which was being put into flax. On reaching the Nixon settlement, we drove over to Fred. Gray's place, where the best crop of wheat in the district north or south is to be seen. Forty acres of wheat Mr. Nixon's and 50 acres on Fred. Gray's was up teninches by actual measurement. Nothing else during the whole drive was found to be above five inches. On enquiring, we found that all the work had been done in the fall and the land was in first-class shape.

Our next stop was at the half-way house (Baskerville's) where we found over a dozen people at dinner, this being the regular stopping place. There is lots of first-class land here, and Baskervilles are making the most of it. They have a stream breaking out fit good haidings including a

of it. They have a stream breaking outfit, good buildings, including a blacksmith shop, well built stables, etc. One mile past Baskerville's in 16etc. One mile past Baskerville's in 1819, in the ravine, or the springs as it is
called locally, is a very pretty spot,
but a bad place to go through with a
load. A new trail leading off to the
west, missing the hills, has been made,
which is generally used, but we followed the old trail. A long valley, beginning in 17-19, is fine farming country,
where we found a large number of
new buildings are being erected. After
ascending the rise, there is a large flat
piece of country extending to within
five miles of the Saskatchewan River,
broken only by a portion of the sand
hills. A wide strip of good land runs
east, broken by some rough land
around Snake Hole and Boggy Lake.
Extending for about five miles in town-Extending for about five miles in townships 18 and 19, there is a fine country right through to Keithville, where there is a large settlement, about three years old. The country south of Keithville is very rolling. We stopped over night the guests of Mr. R. R. Pearce, at Sandford which is situated in Township 18, Range 19. Mr. Pearce has a very fine home, a building much larger than any resi-Extending for about five miles in townsituated in Township 18, Range 18. Mr. Pearce has a very fine home, a building much larger than any residence in Gull Lake, three stories high, finished off with all modern improvements, large furnace in the basement and probably the best showing of plants and flowers in bloom that is to to be seen in the southwest of Saskatchewan. Near the house is their store, also a 150 foot well with a windmill working the pump. Mr. Pearce has, with his sons, 1,760 acres of fine land, 150 of which is in crop, while two outfits were on breaking. They are making a start to provide for their own hay making a trial this year of ten acres of timothy. A pasture of 100 acres has been fenced in the poles being brought from the sand hills, 35 miles to the west, in 19-22 when Mr. Pearce started building on his place, fourteen months ago, there were only about twenty people in the neighborhood, and now there are over 600: in four townships there are 160 people.
