Inspector's report was read, and, though in all respects not very satisfactory, taken as a whole may be considered a fairly good report. The school has suffered much during the year owing to the illness of one of the assistants, and the attendance was materially affected by the establishment of a continuation class at Eglinton. The standard of the equipment is below the minimum. The Board also appointed a committee to wait on the Ministers of Agriculture and Education re the establishment of an Agricultural Department in connection with the High School. The committee to be composed of Chairman Hill, Secretary McDonald and Trustee Redditt. The salaries of the Public School Teachers was raised fifty dollars all around.
