FISH AND GAME PROTECTION.

A new departure, but one that should receive the approval of all sportsmen, marks, the August issue of Rod and Gun in Canada, published by W. J. Taylor, Ltd., Woodstock, Ont. The greater portion of the reading pages is given up to the reproduction in full of the Interim Report of the Ontario Fish and Game Commission. As a rule Government publications receive only scant attention and have but a limited circulation.
