Duggan—Wells—That the Clerk is hereby authorized to notify R. Norman and M. Mitchell, executors of the estate of the late Thos. Riddle, to meet the Council on the above estate on Sept. 17 at 2 p.m. to consider the question of securing a gravel pit.

Lemon—Duggan—That the Clerk get printed 50 copies of by-law for distribution granting a bonus of \$5.00 to parties destroying dog or dogs found worrying sheep.

Lemon—Wells—That this Council grant \$5 to improve what is known as Mill Road on con. 3.

By-law No. 224, to grant a bounty of \$5 for killing dogs found worrying or killing sheep or lambs; By-law No. 225, to appoint collectors of rates with the names of R. Rutherford and A. Hambleton as collectors; By-law No. 236, to raise certain sums for county, township, special and general school purposes, and By-law No. 237, to raise certain sums for special purposes known as trustees rates, received their several readings and passed.
