DEATH OF MR. BOYLE.

The death of Mr. David Boyle, which took place in Richmond Hill on Sunday, September 25, in his 90th year removes one of the oldest residents of the village and one of the pioneers of York town-ship. The late Mr. Boyle was a native of Ayrshire, Scotland, being born in the parish of Soru, the 31st of October 1820, coming to Canada in one of the early sailing ships in the spring of 1842. He located at York Mills where he worked at the blacksmithing trade for 11 or 12 years, and by his industry and close application to business became prosperous. With his savings he now invested in land, one of his first purchases being lot 20 on the 2nd Concession of East York.

Here he lived seven years after, which he leased it to move to a new purchase, Lot 45 Concession 1 in the township of Vaughan, two hundred acres of heavily timbered and practical-

ly uncleared land. Here Mr. Boyle did arduous pioneer labor, operating a saw-mill on the place as well as the farm very successfully, for over twenty years. In 1881 he retired to this village where he has resided ever since. Mr. Boyle always took an intelligent and active interest in public affairs being an enthusiastic Liberal and a consistent reader of the Globe from his earliest days in the province. Mr. Boyle has held the offices of councillor and reeve of the township of Vaughan and officiated on the Richmond Hill Board of Education

on the Richmond Hill Board of Education for over twenty years.

He married, on the 13th of November, 1848, Anne Williamson who predeceased him by almost half a century. Of this marriage five children were born, four of whom survive, namely David, John, Mary Ann and Matthew, Agnes, a second daughter dying in her Agnes, a second daughter dying in her youth. Mr. Boyle was hale and vigorous up to within a short time of his death and, to the end, took a deep interest in all matters relating to the public weal. As a man who prospered bonestly, who lived cleanly and temperately, who did not shirk his duties as parent or as citizen, and who was always for progress and the good of the community Mr. Boyle deserved the respect in which he was held in Richmond Hill and vicinity.

The remains were placed in the family plot Tuesday afternoon, after a service at the house, conducted by the pastor, Rev. E. C. Currie, many old friends being present from a distance
