DEATH OF NICHOLAS LYNETT.

We record this week the death of Mr. N. Lynett, one of the pioneers of the County of York. He was born in Mayo County, Ireland, in the year 1821, and came to this country with his parents when about 11 years of age, the family first settling at Thornhill. About 70 years ago he married Esther, eldest daughter of the late David Eyer, Sr. The then newly married couple settled on their farm, lot 22, con. 2, Markham, a mile east of this village, where they resided until Mrs. Lynett died about 5 years ago, and where Mr. Lynett lived until he removed here less than two years ago. On the farm Mr. Lynett's first work was to cut down the trees and clear a place on which to build their house. Deceased was a good friend and neighbor, and was highly respected in the community. He was of a strong constitution, and enjoyed good health until about two years ago, when he suffered a paralytic stroke. Another stroke followed about five weeks ago, and a third a couple of days before he passed away early Monday morning. Mr. and Mrs. Lynett celebrated their Golden Wedding in the year 1892.

The funeral took place from his late residence yesterday morning, followed by interment in Thornhill cemetery. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Father Grant, who referred in feeling terms to the memory of the departed.

Of a family of nine children, two died in infancy, David a few years ago, and John several years earlier. The surviving members are Bridget and James at home, Nicholas in Indiana, Mrs. Hewis in Barrie, and Fred in San Francisco.
