THE OLDEST POSTMASTER IN CANADA.

We are again pleased to offer our congratulations to our esteemed fellow-townsmen, M. Teefy, Esq., on being the oldest postmaster in Canada. Mr. Teefy received his commission from the Marquess of Clanricarde, then Postmaster General of England, on the 3rd of December, 1850. Mr. Teefy has, therefore, been Postmaster for more than 60 years. The Deputy Postmaster General at that time was T. A. Stayner, and in the following year Canada had her first Postmaster General in the person of James Morris, Esq. Since Mr. Teefy's appointment there have been twenty-two Postmasters General, the first, Mr. Morris, referred to above, the present occupant, Hon. R. Lemieux.
