## MR. McWILLIAM'S DEATH.

On Wednesday of last there passed away an old pioneer in the person of Jas. McWilliams. He was born in the county Derry, Ireland, in the year 1821. He came to Canada when still quite young. He had always lived around Richmond Hill since coming to Canada. His wife Theresa Hector, predeceased him some eighteen months ago. Since then he had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Fred Lynett where, although being blind was able to walk around till about seven weeks ago when he was confined to his bed. He leaves one daughter and five sons to mourn his loss—Mrs. Lynett of this village, James of Cleveland, John and Bernard of Chicago, Frank of Toronto, and Lewis of Nebraska. The funeral took place on Friday morning to the R. C. Cemetery, Thornhill, Rev. Father Grant conducting the services.
