Minutes of last meeting read and adopted.

An account from Mr. Geo. S. Sims, \$13.00, for work and material on shelves in Public Library room; also from L. Innes & Sons for lumber, &c., \$15.80, for fitting up Library room, was on motion ordered to be paid.

Hume—Brown—That the Secretary apply to the Village Council for the amount of grant voted for remodeling Library room.—Carried.

Brown—Hume—That the Room Committee purchase a stove for the use of the Library room.—Carried.

The Secretary was instructed to add to the list of Library books for immediate purchase:—"The Trail of '98," by Service, and "The Undertow," by Knowles.

The Board adjourned.

VILLAGE COUNCIL.

The Council met, pursuant to statute, on Dec. 15th, in the Clerk's Office. All the members present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

An account from Wm. Trench & Son for \$17.00 was presented and payment ordered.

A letter from the president of the High School Association was read, asking for the use of the Rink for one hour of five afternoons per week.

Mr. F. Sims presented a petition signed by J. Eyer and 77 other rate-payers asking the Council to change the present nights for skating. The matter was laid over for one week, and committees appointed to interview the Band and also the Metropolitan Railway Co., the latter with a view to having the waiting room opened on skating nights until the 10.40 car's departure.

The Treasurer presented his annual statement which was received and the Clerk was instructed to have 100 copies printed for distribution.

Council adjourned.
