Dear Sir,—
As a ratepayer of our Village I was present at the nomination meeting of last evening and listened with much interest to the remarks of the various speakers, and their reasons for asking the support of the electors on polling day, and as the past work of a candidate for re-election should have an influence upon the electorate as to his future usefulness in municipal matters, I wish to draw the attention of your readers to one or two things in which Mr. Pugsley was of service to the village during the past year, and which, with his accustomed modesty, Mr. Pugsley failed to mention. With regard to the Agricultural classes which the government are establishing in connection with the High Schools of the County, Mr. Pugsley has been of great service to our High School here in using his influence with the County Council and also by interviewing the Minister of Agriculture, thereby succeeding in placing Richmond Hill High School on an equality with those of Aurora and Newmarket, with a good prospect of securing the Agricultural School for our own village, which certainly will be of benefit, not only to our High School but to the village generally. Mr. Pugsley was also instrumental in securing a special grant of \$75.00 from the County Council for the Agricultural Society in connection with the new building in the public park. His influence was also exerted to obtain for the village the electric light cluster at Hill's corner, a great improvement in that part of the village, and it is owing to Mr. Pugsley's efforts, assisted by those of Mr. Jno. Palmer, that we now have the waiting room open on skating nights until the 10.30 car has departed, which is without question, much appreciated by the patrons of our rink. BROKE HIS THIGH BONE.

We regret to have to announce that Mr. Sylvester Savage, father of Mr. P. G. Savage of this village, and Mr. John Savage of the 2nd of Vaughan, met with a serious accident Friday evening. He was walking in the yard at Mr. John Savage's home when he slipped and fractured the thigh bone at the hip. The doctor bandaged the injured parts, and made Mr. Savage as comfortable as possible. He is in his 88th year.

REV. JOHN SHUNK'S DEATH.

Rev. John Shunk died at his residence on Carson street, Sunnyside, at six o'clock Monday morning, December 19, 1910, after a protracted illness of tuberculosis. Mr. Shunk was 61 years of age on November 5th last. He was born in York County, Ontario, 17 miles from Toronto. He is survived by his widow, two sons, Vaughan and Heber, and one daughter, Cotta, besides seven brothers and one sister, all of whom reside in Ontario except one brother who is dentist in Columbiaville, Michigan. He was married to Miss Mona Fishburn, daughter of Rev. J. Fishburn, August 31, 1887, in Millersburg, Pa. He served charges in Sherbrooke, Ohio, 5 years; Jewett, Ohio, 4 years; Williamsburg, Ont., 9 years; Harrison City, Pa., 2 years and 3 months; Smithton, Pa., 2 years and 3 months. Mr. Shunk came to Morgantown September 20, 1909, to reside that his children might have the advantage of the University. He was a devoted member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church of this city. Services will be held at the residence at 2 p.m. today conducted by Rev. John A. Yount. Interment will take place at Hoffman's Church near Smithton, Westmoreland county, Pa. — The New Dominion, Morgantown, Va.
