DOUGALD McLEAN'S DEATH.

Dougald McLean died about one mile south of this village on the 31st of December, 1910. He was born on the 12th of January, 1825, in Campbelltown, Argyleshire, Scotland, and emigrated to Canada in 1854 in an old sailing vessel which took 8 weeks and 4 days to cross the ocean. He settled in Willowdale, in York County, and was engaged in agricultural pursuits for many years. In religion he was a Presbyterian, and in politics a Liberal. The late Mr. McLean was a man who did a great deal to improve the standard of plowing. For many years he and his brothers took nearly all the prizes at the plowing matches, and assisted greatly in bringing the plowing up to the high standing it is to-day.
