

Local option gained much ground in the January contests. Twenty-four carried the by-law, cutting off sixty-one licenses. Twenty-eight more would have carried had it not been for the three-fifths clause. It is a significant fact that where once established local option is rarely repealed. The liquor interests had a chance to bring on contests for repeal in 134 municipalities, but they only made the attempt in 3 places, and of these every one failed.

The Chapman-Alexander special meetings now carried on in Toronto are likely to be successful in a quiet way. Dr. Chapman has declared that preaching alone will not save the city. What is required is more personal work among those who are careless about their spiritual welfare.
