The Canadian Farm has been taking a post-card opinion of its subscribers on the reciprocity agreement, now before Parliament, and after four weeks' campaign the replies show that the farmers of Canada are overwhelmingly in favor of the agreement. The replies from Ontario show a majority of five to three in favor; in New Brunswick, two to one in favor; in Nova Scotia, three to one; in Prince Edward Island, almost unanimous in favor; in Manitoba, four-fifths in favor; in Saskatchewan, almost unanimous in favor; in Alberta, ten to one; in British Columbia, opinion appears to be quite evenly divided; in Quebec, five to two.

The other eclipse of the sun for 1911 falls on October 12th, but will not be visible in Canada.
