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#### DEATH OF GRAHAM KLINCK.

The Princeville Telephone records the death of Mr. Graham Klinck, who was an uncle of Mrs. Jesse Grant and Mrs. Amos Wright of this village, and who formerly lived in Richmond Hill. The following paragraphs are taken

from the Telephone: Graham Klinck was born near Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada, April 12, 1830, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Collins, at Castleton, Illinois, March 27, 1911, lacking but fifteen days of reaching the end of his eighty-first year. He was the youngest of eleven children born to Leonard and Elizabeth Brown Grant Klinck, and is survived by one

brother and one sister.

At the age of 19 years Mr. Klinck came to Princeville and here has been

his home for nearly sixty-two years.

March 2, 1859, he and Miss Sarah E. Alexander were married, and this union of more than fifty two years is broken by the death of the husband. To them were born five children, three daughters and two.sons. One son died in infancy, and the other, Knowlton G., lives in Knoxville, Illinois. The daughters are Mrs. C. A. Collins, Castleton, Illinois; Mrs. W. F. Boyes, Galesburg, Illinois, and Ruby J. of

Mr. Klinck was a man of much independence of thought and opinion. His integrity of purpose and action was most consistent. He was always un-willing to place himself in what might seem a false position, and one of his marked characteristics was the desire that his work should stand as that of a man who believed in doing honestly and well whatever he undertook.
