The Sentinel says "The Roman Church plays one party against the other, ready to take any side which seems to promise them the greatest advantage." The difference seems to be that whereas the Catholic Church is free to take either side in politics, the Sentinel invariably supports the Pory party.

When many of the foremost men of the world are working to bring about universal peace, does it not seem a pity that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C.P.R., speaks so lightly and so flippantly of the horrers of war. Sir Thomas is reported as saying a few days ago, "It is very nice to hear all those noble purposes for the avoidance of war, but one is inclined to question whether the suppression of war is good for the world. A war, now and then acts after all, as a sort of clearance of the surplus With some people it population." seems to matter little how many mothers and widows are bereaved, or bow many children are left to face the world alone. The world must be cleared of "surplus population."

A woman who signs herself "A Loyal Protestant," writing in the Sentinel, says: "The Orangeville School Board is composed of at least onehalf Orangemen, and yet they have one Roman Catholic school teacher in their school, and are now about to engage another of the same faith." "I have no fault to find with the teacher. She is a nice person, I believe, but I have lived among Catho. lics and know what they are." "In view of recent proceedings among Roman Catholics is it wise to give them this power," &c.

Evidently the Orangeville School Board are guided more by common sense than by bigotry. It would be unwise to dispense with the services of a good teacher if her religion is her only "fault."

It is not surprising to find that the principal farm journals in Canada are very much in favor of the proposed trade agreement between the Dominion and the United States, giving this country a larger market for their products. The Canadian Farm, the Weekly Sun, the larmers' Advocate and other papers have each given many good reasons why the larger market would be beneficial. The Farmers' Advocate had, the following editorial note in a recent issue: --

"If anyone has cause to object to the reciprocity pact, it is the American farmer who yields us a more lucrative market than we open to him. But even he stands to lose little, and should welcome the agreement as a first step towards breaking down of that absurd and chaotic tariff under which he has been for generations fleeced."

Canadians Eat Eggs From Many Countries

We Bought Over Nine Million Eggs from the United States Last Year and Large Quantities from China

Canada imported 893,324 dozen eggs
during the fiscal year ending March
31, 1910. From the United States the result of the enquiry is shown in 31, 1910. From the United States the result of the en alone 757,316 dozen eggs came to Cantaga. China sent us 87,075 dozen, and Hong Kong 41,245 dozen, while small quantities came from Great Britain, France and Japan.

Our egg exports amounted to 164,-835 dozen, but only 39,917 dozen went from Canada to the United States, so that we bought from the Americans 717,399 dozen more eggs than we sold to them. Canada sold 33,465 dozen eggs to Great Britain, 20,947 dozen to Newfoundland, 10,700 dozen to Ber-muda, 2,196 dozen to the British West Indies, 44,100 dozen to Cuba, 12,555 to St. Pierre and a few dozen to British Guana, Mexico and China.

Deducting our total exports of eggs from our total imports of eggs it will be found that Canadians consumed 728,489 dozen more eggs than the total

production of eggs in Canada.

The duty on eggs coming into Canada is three cents per dozen. If the Reciprocity Agreement goes into effect this duty will be removed and the importations of eggs will greatly in-

A board of tariff experts, recently appointed by the United States Govappointed by the United States Government to compare Canadian and American prices, has reported on the price of eggs at Buffalo, Toronto, Burlington, Vt., Montreal, Lancaster, N.H., Sherbrooke, Que., Ogdensburg, N.Y., Prescott, Ont., Burgor, Eastport and Calais, in Maine, and St. Stephen, N.B.

Reciprocity will give Canadian farmers the privilege of selling their eggs in the United States at lower prices than they can get for them in Canada, and it will give farmers of Anstra-lasia, the United States and twelve other foreign countries the right to send eggs into Canada free of

The report of the United States Government experts also deals with the prices of other farm products in the two countries. The Canadian the two countries. The Canadian Century will publish the figures in future issues and those who read them will be convinced that Canadian farmers have nothing to gain by Reci-procity with the United States.
