AFTER THE LEMONVILLE WATER.

Reeve Pugsley and Councillors Palmer, Sims and Tyndall had a conference Saturday evening with Mayor Brown and the other members comprising the Council of North Toronto. The subject under discussion was the advisability of getting a supply of pure water from the artesian wells in Whitchurch Township. Mayor Brown who presided said that North Toronto had now a sufficient supply, but he thought it was wise to look for future needs, and he was in favor of arriving at some definite decision as soon as possible.

Reeve Pugsley suggested that a gravitation water supply from the Lemonville Wells would be a great addition to North Toronto's attractions as a residential suburb. He referred to the unfortunate water conditions prevailing in Toronto, and doubted whether dwellers in the City could ever be induced to believe that they were getting pure water so long as it was taken from Lake Ontario. He was optimistic with respect to the natural advantages of the scheme, as well as to the volume of water, and he believed it would pay the municipalities who took hold of it. He believed the Legislature would give a franchise to Municipalities, though they refused it to a private company. Every member present from each Council thought the scheme a good one, and after it was discussed a resolution moved by Alderman Howe, seconded by Councillor Sims, was carried unanimously appointing Mayor Brown, Reeve Pugsley, Solicitor Gibson and Engineer James to take the matter up with the owner of the property, and report at a future meeting.
