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REV. DR. TEEFY'S DEATH.

The Rev. Dr. J. R. Teeffy, former
principal of St. Michael's College, and
eldest son of M. Teeffy Esq., Postmas-
ter of this village, died at St. Michael's
Hospital early Saturday Morning, after
an illness extending over two
years, the last two weeks being spent
in the hospital. Dr. Teeffy was very
prominent among the Roman Catholic
divines of Canada, and his death at a
comparatively early age removes a
fine scholar, a courteous gentleman
and a devoted member of his Church.
He received a more than usually thor-
ough education in the Richmond Hill
High School, and subsequently took a
more than usually brilliant Arts
course in the University of Toronto.
It is worthy of note that while he was
able in his first year to win the Uni-
versity prize for Greek verse, he felt
constrained to devote himself to mathe-
matics as his specialty, and he won
at graduation the University silver
medal in that department.

Dr. Teeffy was principal of the High
School at Port Rowan, and afterwards
held a similar position at Beamsville,
as well as teaching for a time in the
Hamilton Collegiate Institute. He
graduated from the University in 1871
and was ordained to the priesthood in 1873,
and spent much of his time in col-
legiate work. He represented St. Mi-
chael's College on the University Sen-
ate and afterwards became by Govern-
ment appointment a member of the
present board of University Govern-
ors. In 1896 the University conferred
on him the honorary degree of doctor
of laws. He was prominent as a
preacher and a platform speaker, and
he was always popular with his fellow-
graduates and undergraduates. But
deservedly popular as he was in every
circle, it was in his parents' home
where he bestowed his greatest love,
and was dearly loved by father, moth-
er, sisters and brothers for his kind-
ness of heart and amiability of char-
acter.

The funeral on Monday was attend-
ed by thousands of people who viewed
the remains which lay in state just
outside the altar rails of St. Basil's
Church. Requiem mass was chanted
at 10 o'clock, after which the body was
conveyed to Mount Hope Cemetery,
where it was interred on the Basilian
Father's plot. The distinguished son
is survived by his father, Mrs. T. Mul-
caby of Orillia, Mrs. Beck of Edmon-
ton, Miss Teeffy at home, Mr. Baldwin
Teeffy of Stockton, Cal., and Mr. Ar-
mand Teeffy of Chicago. Those pres-
ent at the funeral included the two
brothers and three sisters of the dead
priest, Sir Charles Moss, Sir William
Mulock, President R. Falconer of the
University of Toronto, Professors C.
H. C. Wright and A. Baker, Sir G.
Falconbridge, Hon. J. J. Foy, Hon.
Frank Cochrane, Mr. Justice Anglin,
and Senator Coffee, owner of the
Catholic Record of London, on which
Dr. Teeffy was chief editorial writer.

sional services and operation per-
formed on John Mullen, lot 32, con. 6,
farm laborer, who is unable to pay,
said operation having been performed
by Drs. Lockhart of King and Hay of
Toronto. The Reeve having guaranteed
partial payment of said operation.—
Carried.

Saigeon—McNair—That until fur-
ther notice this Council shall pay 12½c
per yard for gravel used on roads.—
Carried.

Witherspoon—McNair—That grants
for hauling gravel be made to the
members of the Council as follows:—
To Reeve Cameron \$50, to Deputy-
Reeve McNair \$50, to Councillor
Whitmore \$100, to Councillor Saigeon
\$50, and to Councillor Witherspoon
\$50.—Carried.
