### HOTTEST DAY ON RECORD

Last Sunday, July 2, 1911, went on record as the hottest day in Ontario. Reliable thermometers recorded 104° in the shade in Richmond Hill. The same figure was recorded in Toronto though the official reading was 101° and this was nearly 2° higher than the previous highest official record in Toronto in 1854, which was 99.2°. The exceptional heat was general throughout the province, and at Stonecliff a small station in the Nipissing district 109° was officially reported to the Meteorological Office. The mercury on Monday reached 103°.
