

## ANOTHER WARNING.

Edward Wilkie was convicted for causing the death of his wife while in a drunken rage. Judge Riddell in sentencing the man to 10 years in the Kingston Penitentiary drew a temperance lesson from the unfortunate tragedy. In addressing the prisoner the Judge said:—

"This is another added to the long and hideous list of victories of which King Alcohol can boast—a woman dead by her husband's hand, a man behind prison bars, children motherless and worse than fatherless. Such cases as yours might almost cause those who see no harm in the sale and use of intoxicating liquors to be willing to be themselves deprived of what they consider a legitimate pleasure derived from the use of the liquors in moderation."

## LIBERAL CANDIDATE.

Mr. W. D. Annis, reeve of Scarborough, will be the Liberal candidate for East York at the election on the 11th of December. The candidate has an excellent record and although the time is short he will make a vigorous campaign from now until election day. Mr. Annis has spent most of his life as a farmer, and commands the respect and esteem of all who know him. Mr. Annis is in full accord with the Liberal policy as laid down by his leader, Mr. N. W. Mr. T. H. Lennox, K. C., of Aurora, is again the Conservative candidate in North York for the coming Provincial election. Speaking on the temperance question at his nomination meeting at Newmarket on Saturday, The World's report quotes Mr. Lennox as follows:—"I express my unalterable support of the three-fifths clause as best likely to ensure permanency in the cause of Temperance."

Mr. J. A. M. Armstrong, M.P. for North York, in addressing a convention of Conservatives at Newmarket on Saturday, in referring to the Quebec Nationalists, said: "I do not know, neither do I care what are the aims of the Nationalist party."

It is sometimes said that an open confession is good for the soul. We imagine, however, that the electors of North York will feel inclined to tell their representative that he should know, and he should care about the aims of the Nationalists. Will Mr. Armstrong also say he does not know there are three Nationalists in the newly formed Borden Cabinet? The Nationalists have proclaimed from scores of platforms that they are opposed to Canada assisting in the defence of the British Empire. Does Mr. Armstrong believe in that policy? If not he should raise his voice against the Nationalists.
