MR. ANNIS' MEETING.

Mr. W. D. Annis, the Liberal candidate for East York, made a most favorable impression at the public meeting in the Masonic Hall, Tuesday evening.

The chair was occupied by Mr. Wm. Pratt. He spoke in favor of the candidate and his leader, Mr. N. W. Rowell, and strongly asserted that Sir James Whitney did not measure up to his former promises.

Mr. Annis censured Sir James Whitney for bringing on the elections long before the end of the term, spoke of the dearth of school teachers owing to the closing of the Model Schools, and discussed the principal questions now before the people. Mr. Annis condemned the teaching of French in so many schools, and felt satisfied that the Premier wished to have the elections over before Dr. Merchant's report on bilingual schools is presented. The speaker advocated a tax on automobiles, a large grant on behalf of the Good Roads system, and incidentally complimented Reeve Pugsley for the excellent work he is doing in connection with good roads. In conclusion Mr. Annis asked for generous support from the electors of Richmond Hill and Markham township.

Mr. McGregor of Toronto, followed in a rattling speech. Sir James said he would oppose all land grants, but afterwards gave Mackenzie & Mann 2,000,000 acres in the northern district. The speaker could not see why temperance people favorable to local option would vote for a Government that allowed every 41 electors to override the wishes of 59. Mr. Rowell if returned to power would restore model schools, would allow local option to carry by a majority vote, and would see that every child was taught the English language.

The meeting closed with cheers for the King and Mr. Rowell and Mr. Annis.
