### VILLAGE COUNCIL.

Pursuant to statute the Council met in the Council Chamber, on Dec. 15, 1911, all members present, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Board of Education re a vacancy on the High School Board, the letter was laid over until the first meeting of the incoming Council. A letter from the British-America Oil Co. was read, upon which no action was taken. The Treasurer's Annual statement was presented and on motion the Clerk was instructed to have 100 copies printed for distribution. The Reeve reported that he had arranged for Mr. James, the Engineer of the Town of North Toronto, to address a public meeting of the Ratepayers on the proposed Electric Lighting system of the Village, the meeting will be held in the Masonic Hall on Wednesday evening, Dec. 27, 1911, at 7.30 p.m. and it is expected that full information regarding the lighting of the Village will be given.

On motion of Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Palmer, the band was granted \$30.00 for the purchase of a new instrument.

On motion the band was engaged to play at the rink on Saturday nights, at \$4.00 per night.

Mr. W. Palmer addressed the Council on behalf of the Hockey Club with a view of obtaining the use of the rink for the coming season. The use of the rink was granted to the Hockey Club for the one and a half hours from 8 to 9.30 o'clock, on Tuesday and Friday evenings, at a fee of \$1.50 per night.

On motion the Village Constable was instructed to enforce the By-law with regard to Charivaris.
