## KING TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The above Council met at the Tem-  
perance Hall, Kettleby, on Saturday,  
Feb. 17. Members all present. Min-  
utes of last meeting read and adopted.  
Several communications were received  
and read.

Council in committee of the whole.  
Mr. McCabe in the chair, when a num-  
ber of bills were passed and ordered  
paid.

The following resolutions were  
passed:—  
That a refund of dog tax be made to  
Geo. McClure.

That \$2.00 be paid Morley Moffit re  
horse hire re services as Sanitary In-  
spector.

That the following sheep claims be  
paid:—Norman Doan, \$39.34, Luke  
Gibbons, \$7.34.

That Walter Brown be paid \$10.00  
re killing two dogs caught in the act  
of worrying sheep, in accordance with  
By-Law.

That Henry C. Webb be paid \$200.  
for Lease of Gravel pit for a term of  
12 years.

That R. Rutherford and L. H. Hol-  
lingshead, Tax Collectors, each re-  
ceive the balance of their salary, \$40.

That the Collectors each receive  
\$2.50 for postage &c.

That this Council desire to go on  
record as opposed to the application  
made by the town of North Toronto,  
to the Provincial Legislature asking  
for the prohibition of the Toronto &  
York Radial Railway Company from  
carrying freight on Yonge Street, and  
that a copy of this resolution be for-  
warded to T. H. Lennox, County Sol-  
icitor, and that the seal of the Corpora-  
tion be attached hereto.

Whereas Legislation is being asked  
from the Legislature of this Province  
to permit of the expropriation of lands  
and sinking of artesian wells in the  
Township of Whitechurch and the pi-  
ping of the water obtained thereby to  
the Town of North Toronto. And  
whereas this Legislation is being asked  
to extend in any direction for thirty  
miles from the aforesaid municipality,  
and the lakes and springs on the high-  
lands of King come within the limit of  
thirty miles.

Therefore that this Council strongly  
protest against the said Town of North  
Toronto or any other, than local  
Municipalities being allowed to have  
and take water from the said range of  
hills running through the Township of  
Whitechurch and King, and that the  
Clerk of this Municipality be instructed  
to forward a certified copy of this  
resolution to the Chairman of the Leg-  
islative Assembly and to T. H. Lennox  
M. P., requesting the latter to  
strongly oppose the Legislation being  
sought by the said Town of North  
Toronto.

That a grant of \$75.00 be given re  
graveling South Townline, between  
Cons. 6 and 7, in conjunction with  
Vaughan Council.

Wells—McCabe—That a grant of  
\$100.00, be given re graveling sidewalk  
between lots 10 and 11, Con. 6, east end.

Councillor Lemon gave notice that  
at the next regular meeting of the  
Council he would move that the  
Council go into committee of the whole  
to discuss the advisability of re-arrang-  
ing the Statute Labor System.

By-law No. 256 To regulate and  
determine the Rate of Wages for la-  
bor performed re municipal purposes,  
and By-law No. 257 re Bowling Allies  
&c. received their several readings and  
passed.

Council adjourned to meet at  
Wright's Hotel, Nobleton, on Satur-  
day March 30th.

### News Note.

Col. Roosevelt has announced his  
candidate for nomination for the  
Presidency of the United States.

Hon. Geo. P. Graham was last  
Thursday elected a member of the  
House of Commons in South Renfrew  
over his Conservative opponent, Dr.  
Maloney. The majority was about 300.

Mr. A. Yule, Collector of Customs at  
Aurora ever since the office was cre-  
ated, has been dismissed from office.  
It is said that no complaint has ever  
been laid against him as Collector of  
Customs.

An investigation will be made re-  
specting the charges against the of-  
ficials of the Mimico Industrial school.  
Superintendent Ferrier has stated that  
the charges of cruelty made in affidavit  
were false.

Tuesday's papers reported the case  
of a man and his wife who resisted the  
efforts of a bailiff who visited the  
premises to make a seizure. The man  
was sent to the Central Prison for six  
months, and the woman four months  
in jail.

At Friday night's special session of  
the North Toronto Council, Solicitor  
Gibson was instructed to fight the ap-  
peal of the Toronto and Niagara Power  
Company to the Privy Council. This is  
the sensational case in which the  
North Toronto local police figured in  
the wholesale arrest of about twenty  
employees of the company last fall  
while engaged in putting up poles at  
Eglinton avenue.

The Council met on Monday, Feb.

The Council decided to expend \$75.  
on the Pickering Townline, providing  
that township spend a like amount,  
and also \$250 on Whitechurch Town-  
line providing that township do the  
same.

The auditor's report was read show-  
ing the receipts for 1911 to have been  
\$45,859.22 and disbursements, \$35,741.  
28.

The clerk was requested to write the  
member for East York, requesting  
him to use his influence against North  
Toronto's efforts to get the supply of  
water from the ridges north of us.
