

LIBERALISM IN QUEBEC.

The return to power of Sir Lomer Gouin's Government in the Province of Quebec by an overwhelming majority will give an impetus to Liberalism over the whole of the Dominion, and will doubtless have an effect on the approaching elections in Saskatchewan. In a house of 81 the Conservatives are likely to have only 18 members. The Liberals have been in power in Quebec for 15 years, and it is generally conceded that during that time there has been clean and progressive government.

The result last week is an indication of the weakening strength of the Nationalists led by men of the stamp of Bourassa and Lavergne, and may lead to a breakdown of the Conservative-Nationalist alliance. In fact Mr. Lavergne has stated publicly that the Nationalists were deceived last September, and Mr. Bourassa was out of the country when the Quebec elections took place last week.

A NOTED WELSHMAN.

The Sunday School Banner, in its notes on last Sunday's lesson, has the following paragraph relative to Mr. Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer in England:

"In a remote district of Wales a babe lay seriously ill. The widowed mother became desperate and walked five miles in the night through a drenching rain to secure the skill of a physician for her darling child. The doctor hesitated about making the unpleasant trip. Would it pay? He would receive no money for his services, and besides, if the child's life was spared, he would no doubt become only a poor laborer. But love for humanity and professional duty conquered and the life was saved. Years afterward, when this same child, Lloyd George, became Chancellor of Great Britain, the old doctor said, 'I never dreamed that in saving the life of that child on the farm hearth I was saving the life of the national leader of Wales.' He might have added, 'the life of one of the finest Christian statesmen Great Britain has produced.'"

The Welsh Disestablishment Bill passed its second reading in the House of Commons last Thursday by a majority of 81.

News Notes.

Theodore Roosevelt on Tuesday won a sweeping victory in the Presidential Republican primaries for Ohio. As President Taft was defeated in his home state his chances for renomination are not bright.

Three thousand and fifty dollars in fines were imposed in South Porcupine and Cochrane last week as a result of visits paid to these points by Provincial License Inspector George E. Morrison of Toronto. Ten convictions for illegal liquor-selling were recorded at South Porcupine and at Cochrane, each defendant being assessed \$100 and costs.

It is reported in North Toronto that the Dominion Government has purchased the southeast corner of Montgomery avenue and Yonge street in Eglinton to be used as the site for a new postoffice. The lot is part of the Oulcott Hotel property, and is at present occupied by the old stable buildings. An appropriation of \$45,000 was made in the estimates last Parliamentary session for a new postoffice in this section, and the report is generally believed.

It was a distinguished group of gentlemen who participated last Friday night in the leading Lancers at the York Club ball. Men eminent in the judiciary, in finance, banking, transportation, and politics, were represented, while the Governor-General and Col. Lowther represented the State and the Army. The gentlemen in the Lancers were: H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, Colonel Lowther, Chief Justice Sir William R. Meredith, Sir Edmund Walker, Sir Edmund Osler, Sir John Gibson, Right Hon. R. L. Borden, and Mr. W. D. Matthews. The ladies were the Duchess of Connaught, Princess Patricia, Lady Walker, Lady Gibson, Mrs. J. K. Kerr, Mrs. Borden, Mrs. Matthews, and Miss Pelly.

Bonar Presbyterian Church, Toronto, corner of College street and Lansdowne avenue, was the gathering place Sunday afternoon of two hundred Scottish people, who participated in a Gaelic service such as was common in Presbyterian churches two generations ago. It was a unique event. There was no choir, and there was no organ in use. Instead, Mr. Alexander Fraser, the Provincial Archivist, acted as precentor, conducting the singing in the old fashioned way, with the aid of a tuning fork. Psalms, not hymns, were sung, and the Scottish folk present entered heartily into the spirit of the service. Rev. Dr. Alexander Macgillivray, the pastor of the church, conducted the service, which included the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Rev. Dr. James Carmichael, the veteran clergyman of King, preached the sermon.
