## IS DISESTABLISHMENT "ROBBERY OF GOD"?

The Welsh Disestablishment Bill has passed its second reading by a vote of 348 to 267. But the debate upon it was more than usually acrimonious. The opponents of the Bill fought it most fiercely both inside and outside of Parliament. The Duke of Devonshire had issued a pamphlet in which he referred to disestablishment as "robbery of God," and to this Mr. Lloyd-George replied with more than his usual vehemence. "Don't be know," said he, "that the very foundations of his fortunes were laid deep in sacrilege and built on decorated shrines and pillaged altars?" Lord Hugh Cecil at once entered an angry protest, but Mr. Lloyd-George continued: "Their ancestors robbed the Catholic Church, the monasteries, the abbeys, the almshouses. They robbed the poor, they robbed the dead. Then, when we try to recover some part of this pillaged property for the poor, their descendants accuse us of theft—those whose hands are dripping with the fat of sacrilege." Unfortunately for the noble lords the history of England only too clearly sustains the Chancellor. If disestablishment be indeed "robbery of God," then some of England's noble houses ought seriously to consider the matter of restitution. There seems no reasonable doubt but that the Welsh Disestablishment Bill will become law.

What The Globe said:—"After using the anti-British Nationalists to turn Laurier out, the Tories need not hope now to foist them on Liberalism. If Bourassa rounds on Borden it will be because he feels he has been betrayed. A desire for revenge is not a sufficient qualification for restoration to a place in the Liberal party." What the "truthful" Brockville Times says The Globe said:—"After all the violent diatribes of the pious Globe against the Nationalists, and its stonidities about the 'Borden-Bourassa alliance,' it is now beside itself with delight at the prospect of return of the black sheep and the acquisition of a few more votes against the hated Tory Government."

Toronto City Council, by a vote of 10 to 8, on Monday, decided that it was desirable to annex the Town of North Toronto. The decision was suddenly reached because North Toronto has been negotiating an agreement which will allow the Metropolitan Railway to lay double tracks on Yonge street through that town. The matter now rests with the people of the northern suburb to say whether they will go into the city or not. North Toronto some time ago voted in favor of the scheme, but it was rejected on a vote by the city.

### BOOST FOR WATERWORKS

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL:

Sir,—It was brought very forcibly to my mind the other night when I heard the fire bell ringing and a forty mile gale blowing, the absence of any adequate fire protection in our village. Fortunately for the town's people of Richmond Hill the fire happened to be several hundred yards from any other dwelling, and burned out without any serious loss, except of course to the owner and occupier of the dwelling itself. It is hardly necessary to say that had the fire been anywhere near the centre of the town practically the whole village would have been swept away, as our fire brigade would have been helpless without the necessary water. It seems to me that a decided effort should be made at once to obtain an efficient water supply, even if only for fire protection, especially when we remember what might have been. We have abundance of water for all needs within a few miles of the village, and for \$20,000 or \$25,000 a system could be installed. The whole cost is not a great sum, and in view of the fact that there is at present only a very small debt on the town, debentures could easily be sold, and the cost would not be any burden to the taxpayers. In addition, the population would grow very materially with the increased advantages, and it is within the bounds of reason to assume that it would double within two years. In that event the extra taxable values would practically cover the cost of the system. Then again, we could look for some reduction in the fire insurance rates in the business blocks, which in itself would be a great saving to our merchants and property holders.

It only needs a slight effort on the part of every resident, and I trust that something will be done.

We nearly had a catastrophe. Don't let us stay in that position any longer. Wake up! Let us have a progressive town. It has been asleep long enough. Boost for waterworks, everybody.
