IS DISESTABLISHMENT "ROB-BERY OF GOD"?

The Welsh Disestablishment Bill has passed its second reading by a vote of 348 to 267. But the debate upon it was more than usually acrimonions. The opponents of the Bill fought it Most fiercely both inside and outside of Parliament. The Thike of Devonshire had issued a pumphlet in which he referred to disestablishment as "robbery of God," and to this Mr. Lloyd-George replied with more than his usual vehemence. Don't he know," said he, "that the very foundations of his fortunes were faid deep in sacrilege and built on descrated shrines and pillaged altars?" Lord Hugh Cecil at once entered an angry protest, but Mr. L'ovd-George consinued: "Their ancestors robbed the Catholic Church, the monasteries, the afters, the almshouses. They robbed the poor, they robbed the dead. Then, when we fry to recover some part of this pillaged groperty for the poor, their descendents accuse as of theft-those whose hands are dripping with the fat of sacrilege." Unfortunately for the noble lords the history of Enghand only too clearly sustains the Chancellor. If disestablishment be indeed "robbery of God," then some of England's noble houses ought soriously to consider the matter of Pestitution. There seems no reasonable doubt but that the Weish Disestablishment Bill will become law.

BOOST FOR WATERWORKS

Sir,-It was brought very forcibly to my mind the other night when I heard gale blowing, the absence of any adequate fire protection in our village. Fortunately for the townsp ople of Richmond Hill the fire happened to be several hundred yards from any other dwelling, and burned out without any serious loss, except of course to the owner and occupier of the dwelling itself. It is hardly necessary to say that had the fire been anywhere near the centre of the town practically the whole village would have been swept away, as our fire brihave been swept away, as our fire brigade would have been helpless without the necessary water. It seems to me that a decided effort should be made at once to obtain an efficient water supply, even if only for fire protection, especially when we remember what might have been. We have abundance of water for all needs within a few miles of the village, and for \$20,000 or \$25,000 a system could be installed. The whole cost is not a great sun, and in view of the fact that there is at present only a very small debt on the town, debentures could easily be sold, and the cost would not be any burden to the tax-payers. In addition, the population would grow very materially with the increased advantages, and it is within the bounds of reason to assume that it would double within two largest and the second to the second double within the bounds of reason to assume that it would double within two largest largest and the second double within two largest would double within two years. In that event the extra taxable values would practically cover the cost of the system. Then again, we could look for some reduction in the fire insur-ance rates in the business blocks, which in itself would be a great sav-ing to our merchants and property

holders.
It only needs a slight effort on the part of every resident, and I trust that something will be done.
We nearly had a catastrophe. Don't let us stay in that position any longer. Wake up! Let us have a progressive town. It has been asleep long enough.
Boost for waterworks, everybody.
