On the 25th May there passed away one of Richmond Hill's best citizens in the person of Mr. John Bestard. Born in Sussex, England, in 1835, he with his six brothers and sisters came to this country with his parents, settling at Thornhill. At this time he was two years of age, and when seven years later his father died, he and his older brother became the support of the family. Thus being early thrown upon the world be was denied the usual opportunities of obtaining an education. Starting at the now insignifi-cant wage of \$2 per month he worked among the farmers of Vaughan Township until he started farming for himship until he started farming for him-self when about 21 years of age on a farm near Langstaff, and marrying a little later Miss Mary Schell, also of Vaughan. He remained here some nine years, when he removed to a farm near Victoria Square, where he lived eight years until he bought a farm on the 2nd concession of Markham. At the latter place his wife died, leaving one daughter. Some few years afterward he married Miss Mary Mitchell of Richmond Hill, and leven years ago he retired from the farm, buying a residence on Rich-mond street, where he lived until his death. Though deprived of the advantages accruing from education he was a man of great influence and strong character. For many years a stanch member of the Tunkard Church, he also successfully conducted a Sunday School for several years, beside acting as a prominent official of the church to which he belonged. He was always a friend to the poor and those in sorrow and affliction, and many can testify to kindnesses and practical sympathy received from him during his long life. Beside an[#] in-valid wife and one daughter he leaves many friends who shall miss him and who would wish their end to be such as his.
