VILLAGE COUNCIL

The Court of Revision met on Tues-
day, June 11th, in the Council Cham-
ber, to consider appeals against the
assessment of the Village for the cur-
rent year. Present Messrs. Pugsley,
Sanderson, Tyndal, Palmer and Sims.
Having taken the customary oath
the Court took up first the appeal of
A. & C. Hopkins who claimed that
they were assessed too high. As it ap-
peared that the land in this case was
overcharged, the assessment on the
land was reduced \$50.

Mr. Robt Tyndal complained that
he was charged more than the average
assessment. The Court could not
see its way clear to make any change
in Mr. Tyndal's assessment.

Mr. John Sheardown appealed
against his assessment on the ground
that he was charged for too much
frontage and also that his buildings
were valued too high. The assess-
ment was not changed.

Mr. Moodie complained that the
land owned by him on Centre St. East
was assessed above its value. The
assessment was left unchanged.

By resolution the Council entered
upon a special session for business. A
resolution to apply for forty horse
power electric energy was moved and
carried. The Clerk was instructed to
write to Mr. W. H. Moore with refer-
ence to the resolution and also to ask
for information as to prices, etc.

The By-law Committee was instructed
to bring in a by-law at the next
meeting of Council with reference to
the annexation of a part of Markham
Township. Council adjourned.
