DEATH AND INTERMENT

Although it was generally known that Mrs. Wm. H. Glass had been in failing health many friends and acquaintances heard with regret of her death which occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. E. Stoddart in Cookstown last Thursday, July 18, after an illness of six months. The remains were conveyed here, and the funeral took place from her late home to the Richmond Hill Cemetery Saturday afternoon. After interment, service was held in the Methodist church where she had long been a member. The sermon was preached by Rev. T. Campbell, a former pastor, who took his text from Isaiah 66-13. The preacher in tender words spoke of deceased as a loving mother and kind friend, and urged upon the relatives to follow closely in the footsteps of deceased and her husband, the latter having passed away on the 27th of January, 1897.

The maiden name of deceased was Elizabeth Ann Pugsley. She was born at Puddington, Devonshire, England, and was the eldest daughter of John and Mary Ann Pugsley,—the eldest of a family of 9 sons and 7 daughters. She was married at Crediton, England, Feb. 4, 1871, to Wm. H. Glass, and came to Canada in July of the same year, settling in Richmond Hill where they resided until their death. Their six children are Reuben W. of Cookstown; John of Richmond Hill; William A. of Midland; Mrs. W. E. Stoddart, Cookstown; Albert E. Richmond Hill; and Mrs. (Rev.) E. H. Toye of Hillsdale. The four sons and two sons-in-law carried the remains to the last resting place in the family plot in the village cemetery.

"OUR GROWING TIME."

Under the above heading Mr. H. C. Bailey of Maple in a summer circular to his customers points out the great change that business has undergone during the past ten years. Mr. Bailey, realizing that his patrons demand quick service, is making arrangements for changing from horse to motor delivery, and hopes to have the new service in operation by the first of August. At present Mr. Bailey makes regular deliveries to customers within a radius of a few miles around Maple, but with the new motor truck he hopes to widen the radius. The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council yesterday reversed the judgment of the Court of Appeals of Ontario, Canada, delivered on February 1, this year, in the case of the Toronto and Niagara Power Company. The Privy Council finds that the company is entitled to erect poles and string power wires along the streets of North Toronto for the distribution of electric power without the consent of the city corporation.
