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Report of the Dairy and Cold Stor-  
age Commissioner.

The Branch of the Department of  
Agriculture, supervised by the Dairy  
and Cold Storage Commissioner, em-  
braces four divisions which deal with  
dairying, fruit, extension of markets  
and cold storage. Each division em-  
bodies a far reaching service calculat-  
ed to foster and assist the industries  
concerned and now requires the ser-  
vices of about one hundred employes  
including many technical and semi-  
technical officials.

During the past year, a number of  
new features have been commended.  
In connection with the cow testing  
service, a number of dairy record cen-  
tres have been established for the pur-  
pose of assisting and encouraging the  
improvement of milking herds. Then  
in two districts model factories are  
being established for experimental  
and demonstration purposes.

During the past year a special in-  
quiry was made into the fruit growing  
industry of the Dominion. The re-  
port of the officials doing this work is  
promised at an early date.

The Extension of Markets division  
gives considerable attention, among  
other things, to the work of compiling  
wholesale prices in different markets  
for animal and agricultural products.  
Through the services of this division  
the Commissioner, Mr. J. A. Ruddick,  
is in a position to give reliable and in-  
telligent advice to Canadian shippers  
seeking new markets, or to others  
looking for such products as Canada  
has to dispose of.

Through the cold storage service,  
subsidies are paid for the erection and  
operation of cold storage warehouses,  
and bonuses are granted under cer-  
tain conditions to creameries that con-  
struct cold storages. During the past  
fiscal year, six contracts for the pay-  
ment of subsidies, under the Cold  
Storage Act, were entered into, while  
47 bonuses of \$100 each were paid to  
creameries. Important works to fa-  
cilitate the safe transportation of per-  
ishable food products were carried on.

The whole work of the Branch for  
the year ending March 31st, 1912, is  
reviewed in the Annual Report of the  
Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner  
just out. Copies will be sent on ap-  
plication to the Publications Branch  
of the Department of Agriculture at  
Ottawa.

Ontario Sunday School Association  
Appoints Successor to Rev. R. J. M.  
Glassford, B. D. Field Secretary.

At a special session, called for the  
purpose, the Central Executive Com-  
mittee of the Ontario Sunday School  
Association engaged Mr. Preston G.  
Orwig as Superintendent of the Sec-  
ondary Division of the Ontario Sunday  
School Association. At a former  
meeting it was decided that, in select-  
ing a successor to Rev. Mr. Glassford,  
the effort should be made to secure  
one trained in special work with the  
Secondary Division, comprising the  
Intermediate and Senior Departments  
of the Sunday School, familiarly  
termed the "teen age." The Com-  
mittee entrusted with the recommen-  
dation has been at work investigating  
all through the summer months, and  
found difficulty in making the choice.

During recent years the "teen age"  
has been asserting itself. It is recog-  
nized that here is the broken link in  
the Sunday School work. A special  
Sub-Committee of the Ontario Sun-  
day School Association has been mak-  
ing a definite study of conditions.  
Meanwhile the Boys' Work Com-  
mittee of the Interprovincial Y. M. C. A.,  
feeling the urgent need, has been de-  
veloping what it calls "non-equip-  
ment work", which is an effort to help  
the "between Sundays" problem of  
the youth. In May last the two Com-  
mittees held conference and are plan-  
ing co-operation.

Inasmuch as Ontario is the first of  
all the States and Provinces to place  
a worker in the field in this depart-  
ment, and in view of the fact that the  
Ontario Sunday School Association  
and the Boys' Department of the In-  
terprovincial Y. M. C. A. have both  
developed a spirit and plan of co-op-  
eration, it was felt that the opportu-  
nity which offered was most impor-  
tant, and that it was incumbent upon  
the Ontario S. S. Association to pro-  
vide a trained leader for this Depart-  
ment.

Rev. Mr. Glassford, though resign-  
ing the Field Secretaryship, still re-  
tains the Honorary Superintendency  
of the Adult Department. While Mr.  
Orwig's special attention will be de-  
voted to the Secondary Division, he  
will fill all the requirements of a Gen-  
eral Field Worker.

Mr. Orwig is the son of a minister,  
has a business education, a business  
experience, and though still under  
thirty years of age, has had five years'  
experience as a worker in Sunday  
School, also in the Boy Scout Move-  
ment, and in the boys' department of  
the Y. M. C. A.

Mr. Orwig will spend the last half  
of September in a Training Convention  
Tour with Mr. John L. Alexander, Su-  
perintendent of the Secondary Divi-  
sion of the International Sunday  
School Association, and will report for  
duty October 1st. He will identify  
himself with the membership of one  
of the Toronto Presbyterian Churches.
