DEATH SENTENCE COMMUTED.

Mr. J. W. McDonald, of the law firm of McDonald & McKenzie, MacLeod, Alta., visited his father, Mr. Donald McDonald of Maple, a few weeks ago on his way to Ottawa as counsel for a man named Eberts, who was under sentence of death. Mr. McDonald was called in on the case only after the trial and sentence of death was pronounced. Appeal was made from the trial judge to the Court of Appeal in Alberta, thence to the Supreme Court of Canada, thence to Cabinet in Council, and finally the defence succeeded in having sentence commuted to life imprisonment. We clip the following report from The Morning Albertan, Calgary:—"With only five days yet before him to live before paying the extreme penalty for murdering Constable Wilmet of the R.N.W.M.P., a reprieve has been granted to Fritz Ebert, now in jail at Macleod. Tonight a telegram was received from the Minister of Justice, Ottawa, by Messrs. MacLeod & Grey, counsel for Eberts, announcing that Ebert's sentence had been commuted to life imprisonment. All preparations had been made for the hanging on Monday next, the scaffold built, and witnesses arranged. The commutation of the sentence is a great victory for J. W. McDonald, who conducted Ebert's fight for life. Ebert will likely be removed to the Edmonton penitentiary. The murder was committed at Frank, Alta., April 13, 1908."
