

SURPRISING STATISTICS. Great Britain Grows Over Half Her Food at Home.

R. H. Rew, C.B., assistant secre-tary to the British Board of Agri-culture, has issued in the agricultural statistics of the Board of Agriculture a report respecting food supplies.

Nothing perhaps will more surprise the average Englishman than this report. The man in the street is convinced that the great mass of the nation's food is imported. It is a perfectly common estimate to hear the home-grown quantity put down at one-fifth. Mr. Rew's report shows that, in reality, it is upwards of one-half and that, in value, the home-grown produce is no less than £14,000,000 more than the value of the imports. This is a revelation which will cause considerable enlightenment to the ordinary man in connection with the question of food imports in war time.

The chief sources of wheat imports will also be a matter of surprise to many people. It is popularly imagined that Canada supplies the bulk of the imported grain and that the United States is a close second while next to none is grown at home. As a matter of fact, the greatest individual supply is the home-grown crop and after this comes India, with Canada third and Australia and Argentina not very far behind.

Perhaps the most remarkable thing about these figures is that the home-grown supply has risen slightly on an average for the last septennial period and that while there has been a small increase in the Canadian imports and a large increase in the Indian and Australian imports, there has been a cor-respondingly large decrease in the imports of the United States, the actual figures being as follows:
