MR. W. H. PUGSLEY FOR THE SENATE.

A Toronto Daily stated Tuesday that local Conservatives were putting forth a strong effort to have Mr. W. H. Pugsley, reeve of Richmond Hill, appointed a member of the Dominion Senate in place of Senator Archibald Campbell who died last Sunday.

The Liberal feels sure that should the above appointment be made it will meet with the approval of a large number of people, of both sides of politics, in this section of country. Mr. Pugsley is acknowledged by all who know him to be a gentleman of excellent judgment. He has had wide experience in public affairs, and should make a useful member in any body. He is an ex-warden of the County of York, is at present a member of the York County Highway Commission, and has been prominent for many years in connection with the Toronto National Exhibition. Mr. Pugsley has long been an intelligent worker in Conservative circles, and should the Government give him the appointment it will give general satisfaction in this part of the country.

## LOCAL OPTION GAINING GROUND.

Despite the handicap of the three-fifths clause the temperance forces in Ontario won many victories on Monday, clearly showing that local option is popular, and that year by year people are becoming more convinced that the open bar is a nuisance and an injury to morals in any community.

About 69 licenses were on Monday cut off, and 100 more bars would have been closed but for the requirement of the three-fifths majority. Local option was retained in Owen Sound, Collingwood and Galt where repeal was tried, although the anti in Galt had a small majority. The city of Peterboro gave a straight majority of 476 for local option, but was short of the three-fifths requirement.

## L. O. RETURNS.

Temperance people in this section were particularly interested in local option contests in Markham Township, King and Aurora. The returns showed Monday evening that the measure had been sustained in Markham by a majority of 448, carried in King by 82 over the three-fifths majority, and in Aurora by 107, which was exactly three-fifths of the total vote. In Aurora, however, a recount followed the next day with the same result, but the anti-local optionists now demand another recount before the County Judge.
