lots. The times were fixed yesterday
afternoon in the City Hall after much
animated discussion by the contend-
ing counsel, before Judge Morgan. Mr.
Eric N. Armour, acting for Alfred V.
Snowden, hotelman of Aurora, strong-
ly favored an inspection of the ballots.
Mr. Thomas Urquhart appeared for
the municipality of Aurora, and con-
curred in the attitude of Mr. Raney.
The latter, during the discussion re-
garding the jurisdiction of the Judge,
said: "It is a vicious precedent to set
up."—Globe.
