## WHO IS THE BETTER JUDGE?

Quoting Rt. Hon. Mr. Asquith, Premier of Great Britain, in his speech in Parliament on January 14th, on the navy question, Mr. Hugh Guthrie said:

"On the one hand we have the statement of the Prime Minister of this country (Hon. Mr. Borden) to the effect that in his opinion the situation is sufficiently grave to demand immediate aid, and on the other hand we have the opinion of the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom in these portentous words: 'There never has been a moment, and there is not now, when we have not been overwhelmingly superior in naval force against any combination which could reasonably be anticipated.'"

"Make the comparison" said Mr. Guthrie. "Whose opinion is likely to be correct? What sane man believes that Mr. Borden could in a few short weeks obtain that knowledge of Imperial affairs and foreign policy obtained by Mr. Asquith only after a long career of active participation? Does it seem reasonable that Mr. Borden has formed a correct estimate of the situation and that Mr. Asquith's estimate is incorrect?"

"Lord forgive them; they know not what they do" might well be applied to those who are endeavoring to make the Church relinquish her sacredness in the holy domain of marriage."

The above is an editorial note taken from a recent issue of the Catholic Register. The inference is that Protestants protesting against the No Tolerance Decree are not capable of comprehending the meaning of that remarkable order given by one high in authority. It would be difficult to make a Protestant see that the marriage of a Catholic and a Protestant, solemnized by a Catholic Priest, would be a valid marriage, but that the same couple married by a Protestant clergyman would be living in sin.

The Catholic Register says that The Christian Guardian is publishing the report that a certain priest "is going into Canadian homes and telling the Protestant wife that she is not really married to her Roman Catholic husband." The Register denies the charge, and challenges the Guardian to give the name of the priest. If the Guardian has the name we believe it should be given to the public.
