An inquest was held at the Palmer House Monday evening relative to the accidental death of the late John A. McNaughton who was run over by a G.T.R. train while going for a load of gravel a short distance north of Maple. The following jurymen were empanelled:—J. T. Saigeon, (foreman), T. Cousins, W. O. McDonald, R. Jones, W. Camp, C. Stephenson, H. Jackson, E. Jackson, J. H. Watson, J. A. Rose, T. Chatburn, H. Keffer. The inquest was conducted by the coroner, Dr. T. H. Robinson, and there was also present County Crown Attorney Greer, and Dr. Routley who held the post-mortem. After listening to the evidence the jury's verdict was that the railway employes had done all in their power to prevent the unfortunate and lamentable accident.
