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CENTRE YORK LIBERALS.
Labor Temple, 167 Church Street,
Toronto, was filled Saturday after-
noon at the annual meeting of the
Centre York Reform Association. The
President, Walter Scott was in the
chair, and representatives were pre-
sent from every part of the riding.
A committee composed of W. H.
Clubine, J. S. McNair, Dr. Irwin, W.
Pratt and J. T. Stewart was appointed
to enquire into the finances and re-
port.

Capital speeches were afterwards
made by Sir Allen Ailsworth and
Hatley Dewar K. C. The former
dwelt at length on the consistent
stand taken by the Liberals on the
Navy question, contrasting their
course with that of the Conservative
leaders who were constantly changing
their platform. Mr. Ailsworth pre-
dicted the possibility of a general
election within the next few months.

When nominations were called for a
standard bearer at the next Dominion
Election Mr. H. H. Dewar was at
once proposed amid great enthusiasm.
Mr. Dewar thanked his mover, but
expressed himself as favoring a man
in the riding, promising every support
within his power. Afterwards Mr.
G. W. Verrall of Weston, and Mr.
John Gardhouse of Etobicoke were
proposed, but as it had evidently been
expected that Mr. Dewar would ac-
cept, the meeting on the suggestion of
Mr. Verrall, adjourned two weeks to
meet in the same place on the 22nd
inst. when in all probability a candi-
date will be placed in the field.
