The Liberals of Centre York have made a poor beginning in their campaign to win the riding in the next Dominion election. They met in convention twice, but neither time did they name a candidate who was prepared to accept the honor. It is not surprising that not a few members of the party are inclined to blame the Executive for not being in a position to recommend a strong man who would be willing to accept the honor and responsibility which go with a candidate's nomination. Of course, an executive can only recommend. If the delegates at a convention are not satisfied with the choice of the Executive it is their privilege to make other nominations, but trusting to luck at the last hour is not a safe plan to make a selection for parliamentary honors.

At a meeting last Saturday the matter of recommending a candidate was left in the hands of the Executive. Another convention will be called later to consider their recommendation.

CENTRE YORK LIBERALS.

NO CANDIDATE SELECTED.
The Executive to Name a Standard Bearer.

The Centre York Liberal Association, at its meeting in the Labor Temple on Saturday afternoon postponed the selection of a candidate for the Dominion election. It was decided that the Executive Committee should confer with possible nominees with a view to ascertaining who would stand if nominated, and when this has been done a convention will be called. The names of Mr. George W. Verral, Weston; Dr. P. D. McLean, Woodbridge; Ex-Aid. George Ramsden, Toronto, and Dr. E. F. Havin, Weston, were introduced at the meeting as those of men worthy to carry the banner of Liberalism in an election campaign, but none of these consented to run. Mr. H. H. Dow, K.C., who had declined the nomination at a meeting of the association two weeks previously, was again pressed to accept, but he said he could not for personal reasons. Mr. Dewar was tendered the thanks of the association for having been the candidate in the general election of 1911.

All those named for the honor of representing the Liberal party as the candidate in the next election were present and spoke, except Dr. McLean. His son, Dr. Garnet McLean, Woodbridge, President of the Centre York Liberal Association, announced that Dr. P. D. McLean could not accept the nomination. Each speaker expressed complete sympathy with the principles of the Liberal party, and thanked the meeting for naming him as a candidate.

It was at the suggestion of Mr. F. G. Inwood, General Secretary of the Reform Association for Ontario, who was present, that the meeting decided to defer the nomination until the Executive Committee could report as to a candidate. The suggestion was put to the form of a resolution on motion of Mr. Wm. Pratt, Richmond Hill, and was carried unanimously. Mr. Inwood stated that a general election could not take place before June, even if the House dissolved on the navy or any other question.

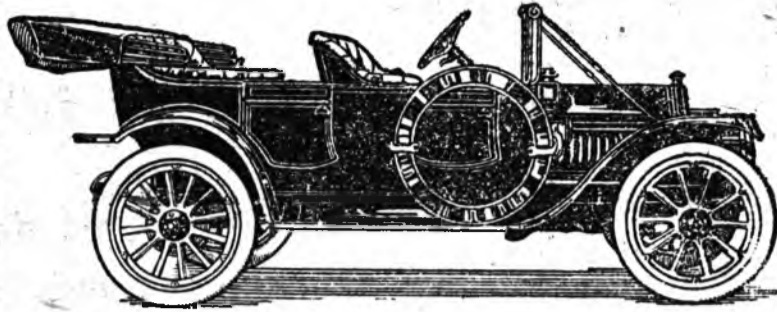
Mr. A. D. Bruce, Markham township, was appointed convener of a committee to look after the financing of the next election campaign. It was proposed to give every Liberal in the riding an opportunity to contribute a dollar. A collection was taken up at the meeting for election. The attendance was large.

Mr. F. T. Congdon, Ex M. P. for the Yukon, gave a spirited address. He spoke strongly in approval of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy on the question of the navy, and recommended every young man to make a study of Liberal principles.

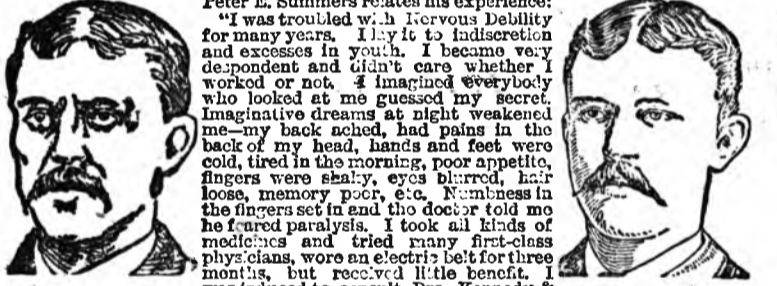
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
