COW CASE.

At Division Court on Monday Joseph Cherry sued Wm. Robinson for \$80 for damages for breach of warranty given on the sale of a cow. The plaintiff and another witness stated on oath that defendant guaranteed that the cow was fresh milk, also that the defendant said the cow would give half a pail of milk after her calf was satisfied. Robinson denied the last statement. It was proved by a former owner that the cow was fresh, but judgment was given plaintiff for \$25 on the evidence of Cherry and another witness that the cow would not give more than five quarts of milk per day.
