Quite a number of the citizens of Richmond Hill and vicinity went to Newmarket Saturday to listen to the speeches at the Liberal Convention for North York. The Town Hall was crowded to the doors and hundreds were turned away. Another meeting, however, was held in the same place in the evening. The two nominations made were T. C. Robinette, K. C. who contested the riding unsuccesstilly in Sept 1911, and Hon. Mackenzie King, formerly M. P. for North Waterloo. As Mr. Robinette declined to accept the honor, Hon. Mackenzie King received the unanimous nomination as Liberal standard bearer at the Next Dominion election. Rousing and inspiring speeches were given by Mr. Robinette, the Candidate, Dr. Michael Clark, M. P. and others. Naturally the principal subject of discussion was the Government Navy Bill. Everybody present was impressed with the idea that Mr. King is one of the strongest candidates that sould be placed in any riding at the present time.
