

Now that a General Dominion Election is among the probabilities it is in order for Tory newspapers and Tory speakers to again raise the cry of disloyalty against the Liberal Party. A few days ago the Mail and Empire said that "nothing would be gastlier for these politicians (the Liberals) than another mustering of the people at the polls to punish another attack on British connection". Mr. Pratt, M. P. P. for South Norfolk, also recently made this offensive insinuation. "Scratch a Liberal and you will find an enemy of Britain."

Both of the above statements were made relative to the discussion in the Commons on the Navy Bill. The Mail and everybody knows that the Liberals' stand in favor of a Canadian navy would in no way endanger British connection, and Mr. Pratt's remark is as untrue as it is insulting.

SALE OF HOLSTEINS

Mr. John McKenzie of Willowdale, who recently sold his farm, had a very successful sale of his Holstein herd of cattle, about 40 head, on Wednesday of last week. The World gave the following account of the sale:—"The best Holstein I have ever seen" was the verdict passed by G. W. Clemons, the ex-secretary of the Holstein Breeder's Association at John McKenzie's sale of pure bred Holsteins, at Willowdale today. The sale from all points of view was a great success—a large crowd, spirited bidding and unusually large prices. The herd was in grand condition, lacking nothing in breeding or in "pail-filling qualities."

The chief features of the sale were the prices given for the heifers. Seven heifers rising two years old brought \$241 each, on an average, one selling for \$295. Seven heifers rising one year old brought \$178 each on an average. The milking cows brought an average of \$188, fifteen head in all. Two sold for over \$300. Lady Summerville Dikol, No. 13850, captured the highest bid of the sale—\$360—from G. S. Goderham of Bedford Park, Ont. She is a remarkably fine cow and well worth the money.

A voluntary remark on the part of Mr. McKenzie after the sale was rather interesting. He considers the importation of American auctioneers to conduct our larger Canadian sales unnecessary, as seems the growing fashion of late. He congratulated the Toronto auctioneer, J. H. Prentice, heartily on the success of the sale.

PRESENTATION AT AURORA.
